

# Report of the Registrar Council Meeting 11 December 2025



## Highlights from the Registrar

# Key enablers for the Common Conditions Service are now available

The Common Conditions Services enables pharmacists to manage and treat patients for an initial eight common conditions, including allowing pharmacists to prescribe where this is the most appropriate option. Development of each of the enablers for the service have been overseen by the multi-stakeholder Department of Healthled Community Pharmacy Expansion Implementation Oversight Group. As of mid-November, the four key enablers are now available:



- 1. Legislative amendments to authorise pharmacists to provide this service.
- **2. HSE clinical protocols for each condition.** When providing the service, pharmacists must adhere to the <u>clinical protocols</u> developed by the HSE and approved by the Minister for Health.
- **3. PSI Guidelines**. The PSI has published new <u>guidelines</u> to facilitate compliance with the legislative framework for the provision of this service. These guidelines provide a principles-based framework, promoting consistency and patient safety, while enabling pharmacists the flexibility to use their professional judgement.
- **4. Training for pharmacists.** Pharmacists who wish to provide the service must complete the online training available via the <a href="#">IIOP website</a>.

On 6 November, the Irish Institute of Pharmacy (IIOP) hosted a <u>webinar</u> that provided an introduction and overview of the Common Conditions Service. The session featured presentations from the Department of Health, HSE, PSI and the IIOP.

Our website has been updated with all of this information (<a href="www.psi.ie/information-and-resources/common-conditions-service">www.psi.ie/information-and-resources/common-conditions-service</a>). We communicated with all registrants via email on 13<sup>th</sup> November and will continue to keep registrants and others informed as more information becomes available. Aligned with the announcement of the Minister for Health, and marking the availability of the training and our guidelines, we issued a press release on 14 November welcoming these developments (<a href="www.psi.ie/news">www.psi.ie/news</a>).

In mid-January 2026, the Department of Health intends to launch a public information campaign about the service.

### Pricing Transparency Guidance published

Following a request from the Minister for Health, on 22 October, the PSI published the Council-approved guidance to support transparency of medicines pricing and fees for pharmacy services in community pharmacies. The guidance evolves existing expectations, in line with the Code of Conduct, regarding pharmacists' responsibilities to provide clear, accurate, and accessible pricing information to patients and the public when charging for medicines, medical devices or fees for pharmacy services.

The guidance contains one primary principle, which is that patients have a right to transparent and accurate information on the price of medicines and health services they access in pharmacies. Transparency of fees and pricing maintains and enhances public confidence in pharmacists and enables patients to make informed decisions about their health and treatment.

The guidance sets out two minimum requirements for pharmacies and a timeline for implementation that has been communicated to those registered with the PSI:

- By 1 December 2025, pharmacies must clearly display information about the cost of all professional services (e.g., vaccinations, blood pressure checks) and the range of dispensing fees.
- From **January 2026**, pharmacies must offer detailed receipts for each transaction, itemising product costs and any service or dispensing fees. The PSI is working with relevant stakeholders to ensure this is enabled.

From 1 December, PSI will commence monitoring the implementation of the pricing transparency guidance.

The Minister for Health welcomed the publication of this new guidance with a press release on 23 October 2025.

#### PSI Pharmacy Workforce Survey Report 2025

This annual survey, now in its fourth year, continues to inform workforce planning and policy development for the pharmacy profession in Ireland. The 2025 survey, commissioned by the PSI and conducted by Grant Thornton, was distributed to all pharmacists registered as of 1 September 2025, with 812 responses to the demographic and work-practice section and 609 responses to the sentiment section. While the response rate was lower than in previous years, the data offers valuable insights into the composition of the workforce, practice settings, and emerging challenges.

The draft survey report was discussed at the November meeting of the Regulatory and Professional Policy Committee, the December meeting of the Workforce Working Group, and is before Council for noting at its meeting on 2 October. It will be published on the PSI website in early 2026.

#### Autumn/Winter 2025/2026 Vaccination Campaign

The current vaccination programme continues to see significant contributions by pharmacies and pharmacists. As of 23 November, c 139K COVID-19 booster vaccines and c 344K flu vaccines had been administered by community pharmacies as part of the Autumn/Winter 2025/2026 vaccination campaign. This includes more than 114K children's flu vaccines administered by pharmacists – representing 58% of the total vaccines delivered to this age group to date. During this period, 1,122 pharmacies have administered a COVID-19 vaccine, and 1,432 pharmacies have administered a flu vaccine.

### Department of Health Electronic Record-Keeping Implementation Group

The Department of Health has recently established a multi-stakeholder Electronic Record-Keeping Implementation Group to progress legislative changes to allow for records to be maintained electronically in pharmacies. This follows commitments made by the Department of Health in the <a href="Community Pharmacy Agreement 2025">Community Pharmacy Agreement 2025</a> (<a href="www.hse.ie">www.hse.ie</a>) to reduce administrative burden in pharmacies and introduce reforms to prescription management and record-keeping.

The group is chaired by the Department of Health and comprises representatives from the Irish Pharmacy Union Pharmacy Practice Working Group, HSE, PSI and a patient representative. Five members of the PSI Executive have been appointed to the group across PSI's business areas of Pharmacy Practice, Policy and Engagement, Community Pharmacy Assurance and Registration and Education. An internal cross-organisational group has also been established within PSI to deliver a coordinated regulatory response arising from the proposed legislative changes.

# HRB funding for partner research project designed to support our public and patient involvement

At the end of 2024, the PSI partnered with Professor Michelle Flood at Royal College of Surgeons Ireland (RCSI) to submit an application to the Health Research Board for Applied Partnership funding to undertake research to further identify and develop evidence-based practical strategies to incorporate the patient and public voice into our regulatory approach. The application has been successful, and funding of €200,000 has been granted, with initial work on the project commencing in 2025. The research is being undertaken to further our strategic commitment to embed meaningful and beneficial public involvement in our work. The PSI is the principal case-study for the research, and the work over two years will be collaborative, gaining the public and patient perspective, involving experienced academics and researchers, and delving into national and international experiences. When completed, the work has the potential to benefit other healthcare regulatory bodies in Ireland and globally.

### Core Funding Review: Public consultation on revised Fees Rules

The PSI conducted a public consultation process over four weeks in November on the proposed PSI Fees Rules 2026, as part of its Core Funding Review Project. We received 728 responses to the consultation, and the results of the public consultation process have been shared with Council.

#### APPEL 4th Year MPharm Students

In September, we welcomed three 4th-year MPharm students who selected PSI to complete their mandatory four-month experiential learning placement. The students completed work on various strategic projects and gained experience across the organisation, including with our Community Pharmacy Assurance, Education and Professional Standards, and Pharmacy Practice and Policy teams. They also assisted at presentations across the Schools of Pharmacy, delivering insights on their placement experience. Their contribution is very much appreciated, and we have really enjoyed the enthusiasm they have brought to their work in PSI.

# Key updates under each of our three Strategic Objectives as we implement our Corporate Strategy 2025-2028.



## **Objective 1**

Regulate Pharmacists and Pharmacies to Deliver Essential and Expanded Pharmacy Services in the Healthcare System

# Recommendations of the Expert Taskforce to Support the Expansion of the Role of Pharmacy

One of the main priorities for PSI is its contribution to the implementation of the Department of Health's Expert Taskforce to Support the Expansion of the Role of Pharmacy. The recommendations of the Taskforce align services and practices that can be delivered by pharmacists and pharmacies, providing an enhanced role for pharmacy within an integrated healthcare system. As highlighted above, as of mid-November, the four key enablers are now available, authorising community pharmacists to provide the Common Conditions Service. Work on introducing a continuation of Contraception service in pharmacies was commenced in 2025 and is expected to be made available in community pharmacies in 2026. PSI also welcomed the HRB report on pharmacist prescribing, which was commissioned as part of the work on the expansion of the role of pharmacy.

### Propose and Implement Policy Changes Agreed with DOH

The PSI have engaged with the DoH on a number of policy initiatives in pharmacy across 2025, including;

- **Pricing Transparency Guidelines**, which were published on 22 October and circulated by email to all registrants on the same date.
- Work has commenced on a new workstream being led by the Department of Health on Electronic Record-Keeping practices in pharmacies. The first meeting of the group took place on 17 November. This work arises from the Community Pharmacy Agreement 2025.

PSI have also been invited to attend a new **Strategic Medicines Access and Availability Group** that will investigate, examine and pursue all appropriate measures that could improve the availability of medicines in Ireland by strategically addressing medicines shortages and gaps in availability, encourage an increase in the number of authorised and marketed medicinal products in Ireland and reduce our national reliance on EMPs. The first meeting took place on 28 November.

#### Regulatory Response to Digital Health Initiatives

Our strategy makes a strong commitment to support pharmacy to embrace digital technologies to support the delivery of safe, effective pharmacy services and to enhance patient outcomes. Chief among the initiatives is the National Shared Care Record and ePrescribing, both initiatives which have the potential to significantly enhance the delivery of services, increase efficiency, and streamline processes. The strategy also highlights an organisational commitment to modernise our regulatory approach and to embrace digital technologies, to enhance service delivery and communications to all stakeholders. PSI are represented on the ePrescribing project board overseeing the procurement and implementation of ePrescribing in Ireland. PSI have also been invited to sit on the Digital for Care advisory Board to advise on the implementation of the HSE eHealth Strategy Digital for Care.

### Development of PSI Safe Staffing Guidance

The PSI <u>Workforce Intelligence Report</u>, published in September 2023, provided a baseline view of the pharmacy workforce in Ireland. The Report provided recommendations to ensure the sustainability of the future pharmacy workforce. One of the short-term recommendations (1-2 years) proposed publishing guidance on the expectations of pharmacy owners, superintendent pharmacists and supervising pharmacists in ensuring safe staffing levels, adequate staffing mix and appropriate rest periods in community pharmacy.

As a result, the PSI has developed proposed 'Safe Staffing Guidance' which sets out the key responsibilities of pharmacists and those in pharmacy governance roles to support compliance with the Regulation of Retail Pharmacy Business Regulations 2008 (as amended). The guidance outlines the regulatory expectations for pharmacy owners, superintendent pharmacists, and supervising pharmacists regarding staffing levels, skill mix, and appropriate rest periods, aligned with statutory obligations, with the paramount aim of ensuring patient and public safety.

The guidance set out an overarching principle, with four indicators to support the provision of safe staffing in pharmacies, with an accompanying self-assessment checklist for those in governance roles to consider in conjunction with the guidelines. They are intended to be supportive, offering flexibility for implementation, as the pharmacist(s), support staff, staff skill mix, and the services provided will be unique to each pharmacy. Regardless of the specific arrangements, however, the same principle and accompanying indicators apply to every pharmacy.

Council will consider the draft Guidance with a view to issuing for public consultation at this meeting.

#### Implement a Delineated Pharmacy Model

At its meeting of 2 October 2025, the Council approved the public consultation report on proposed changes to the RPB Registration Rules to support the operation of a Delineated Operating Model and recommended the proposed RPB Registration Rules for approval and for subsequent submission to the Minister for Health for her consent.

Additional work is currently ongoing to align the legislative framework and ensure that the necessary congruence occurs between PSI and DoH responsibilities.

## Implementation of Recommendations from the Workforce Intelligence Report

The fourth and final meeting of the Workforce Working Group for 2025 was hosted in PSI House on 4 December. The group received a presentation on the final report of the Employer and Employee Pharmacist Forum from Mary Rose Burke, who chaired the Forum.

The key findings from the Pharmacy Workforce Survey Analysis Report were presented to the group by Grant Thornton for discussion, along with an update from members on progress made on actions and recommendations for which they are responsible.

#### MPharm Accreditation

At its meeting on 2 October, the Council approved the sixth MPharm programme in the State, following the accreditation team's recommendation to accredit the proposed MPharm degree programme at South East Technological University (SETU). Following the publication of the accreditation report on our website, we were pleased to highlight the successful accreditation process and issued a press release on 9 October, in coordination with the University, and containing a quote from the Minister for Health.

This concludes the activities against this project for 2025, with annual reporting and compliance visits to take place across 2026.



## **Objective 2**

Evolve our Regulatory Approach to Drive Safe Patient Outcomes in the Delivery of Pharmacy Care

#### Reform of the Pharmacy Act

Since 2018, the PSI has been engaging with the Department of Health on advancing reform of the Pharmacy Act 2007 in the public interest. Reform of the Act was discussed at the governance meeting with the DoH on 9 October and at a 2026 planning meeting held between PSI and DoH on 21 October with a view to agreeing on an approach to progress this work. PSI met with DoH on 25th November to discuss working on the Reform of the Act project in 2026. It was agreed that PSI would prioritise a gap analysis for the Fitness to Practise (FtP) provisions in the Pharmacy Act in order to define the FtP amendments required. This work is to be completed in Q1 2026.

#### Patient and Public Involvement in our Work

#### **PSI Pharmacist Panel**

We continued to deliver on our commitment to ensure the patient and public perspective informs our regulatory approach. The PSI Pharmacist Panel was created to ensure that regulatory changes and pharmacy initiatives are informed by practical experience and expertise. We were pleased to deepen our engagement with our Pharmacist Panel this year, gaining input on several initiatives, including valuable contributions during the consultation period on the draft rules and guidance concerning the Common Conditions Service and during the development of guidance in support of pricing transparency in pharmacies. We were pleased to have some of the panel members attend the launch of our Corporate Strategy in April, having gained their input during its development in 2024. The panel has been in place for two years, and its membership will be renewed this December/January, with an opportunity provided for new members.

#### **HPRA Patient Forum**

The PSI was also pleased to host a HPRA Patient Forum meeting this year, which provided a valuable opportunity to enhance understanding about the role of the PSI, to discuss the expanded scope of practice of pharmacists, including vaccinations, prescribing for common conditions, in addition to a discussion on the delineated operating model. Engagement with both forums provides PSI with valuable insights, expertise and ensures regulatory changes are underpinned by evidence-based informed decision-making. In addition, it further supports building trust in pharmacy regulations.

As highlighted above, at the end of 2024, the PSI partnered with the Royal College of Surgeons Ireland (RCSI) and has been successful in receiving funding of €200,000 from HRB

to undertake research to further identify and develop evidence-based practical strategies to incorporate the patient and public voice into our regulatory approach.

#### Stakeholder Engagement in patient safety and quality initiatives

Year-to-date, the Quality and Safety team has carried out a total of 303 inspections. The team conduct pharmacy registration inspections where there are registration applications for new pharmacy openings and relocations of pharmacy premises. To date, 28 registration-related inspections have been conducted to assess compliance with the Regulation of Retail Pharmacy Business Regulations 2008 and PSI Guidelines.

A total of 274 risk-based pharmacy inspections have been conducted to date. Risk-based inspections are undertaken following a review of information available to the PSI. These inspections focus on a particular area or the general operation of the pharmacy, including inspection/compliance history, or where a member of the public or an external body has raised a concern. PSI Inspectors are continuing to observe increased instances of non-compliance related to the management and supply of Controlled Drugs (CDs). As a result, 44 inspections focusing on CD compliance have been conducted in 2025.



## **Objective 3**

Enhance and Align our Organisation and People to Successfully Achieve our Strategic Priorities and Core Responsibilities

## Strategic HR Update

#### HR Strategy (2025 - 2028)

Utilising the findings of the Culture Audit, Employee Engagement Surveys, Current State Assessments, Operating Model Review, Strategic Workforce Plan and Employee Feedback, the HR Strategy 2025 – 2028 has been developed. This strategy reflects PSI's ambition to remain a modern, responsive regulator in a rapidly evolving healthcare environment, ensuring our people are empowered to deliver on the commitments set out in the Corporate Strategy 2025–2028. Building on the strong foundations of the previous HR Strategy, the new Strategy focuses on strengthening leadership capability, enhancing workforce planning, modernising systems and embedding a culture of openness and inclusion. By investing in capability and fostering collaboration, the HR Strategy will create the conditions for our people to perform at their best and contribute fully to PSI's mission of protecting public health and patient safety through effective regulation.

The Strategy was shared with the Employee Experience Consultative Forum (EECF), the Wider Management Team (WMT) and the Executive Leadership Team (ELT) to seek feedback. The HR Strategy was considered by the Performance and Resources Committee at its meeting in November and is before Council for approval.

We continue to focus on workforce planning and recruitment. Since the last report, the following vacancy was filled.

## **Business Transformation Project**

PSI, having received an effort estimate from our technology delivery partner to digitise mobile inspections and other related functionality for BTP Phase 3, assessed the effort estimate which significantly exceeded available budget and paused related work with our technology delivery partner. PSI have re-framed Phase 3 into 3 components:

- 1. Management of Inspections/Investigations and associated workflow
- 2. Mobile inspections
- 3. Portal aspect

Arising from the delay and in the absence of the delivery of Phase 3, an interim solution for Component 1 has been delivered in-house and was deployed in May. An independent 3rd party has finalised a review into a revised approach to deliver Components 1-3. This review was considered by the Business Transformation Programme Board at their meeting in November, and an update will be provided to Council at its meeting on 11 December.

## **ICT Strategy**

The cloud-based system for Council meeting documentation is in pilot phase, with meetings run through the new system and the old system in parallel. The pilot was completed successfully, with positive feedback received. The December meeting of Council will also be conducted with the new system and the old system in parallel. The new system will replace the current iPad solution used by Council and the Preliminary Proceedings Committee.

Training was completed for Council and PSI administrators. Additional training will be provided in the New Year. Moving to the new solution will help improve the efficiency of meeting preparation and delivery, promote consistency across Council and Committee meetings and reduce the time spent managing the associated hardware. Council and Committee members will use their own devices to access the new system.

The vendor procurement for digital skills training is completed, and the training plan will be finalised in December to schedule ICT training over the coming years.

## **Core Funding Review**

Update on the public consultation on the draft PSI Fees Rules 2026 was included in the highlights of the Registrar section.

## Implementation of the 2024/2025 Climate Action Roadmap

Following on from the approval by Council of PSI's Environmental Policy and the 2025 Climate Action Roadmap in September 2025, the following progress under each of the mandate categories is as follows:

#### Our People:

- The Health, Safety and Sustainability Committee welcomed new members following ELT approval. These new members will be participating in Green Teams training and assisting with the implementation of the PSI's Climate Action Roadmap.
- The Health, Safety and Sustainability Committee issued several communications for Climate Action Week 2025. These included online resources, environmentally conscious recipes, sustainability tips and more, demonstrating our commitment to engaging with staff with sustainability campaigns and resources on a regular basis.

#### **Our Targets:**

- The monthly manual meter reading process is continuing in collaboration with Apleona to ensure consistent readings and ongoing review of utilities use, which is reporting a 13% reduction in electricity usage in the last 12 months compared to the previous 12 months.
- Following on from the successful reduction of energy use during the Christmas closure in 2024, it has been confirmed that PSI House will be closing from the 22<sup>nd of</sup> December 2025 to the 2<sup>nd</sup> January 2026. During this period, non-essential systems will be shut down to reduce energy consumption in a period of low office attendance.

#### **Our Ways of Working:**

• Following on from the approval by Council of the 2025 Climate Action Roadmap in September, a website update has been drafted to update our Climate Action and

Sustainability section, as well as an internal communication to staff. We also intend to include an update in the PSI Newsletter in December.

#### Our Buildings and Vehicles:

- PSI's project to upgrade the Building Management System (BMS) is progressing, with quotation requests issued. The proposed upgrade aims to enhance energy control, reporting capabilities, and overall system accessibility. PSI preference is for transitioning to an open protocol system, which would allow for more flexible and transparent energy management.
- Work is currently ongoing for the annual Display Energy Certificate audit. This is required to be completed each year to ensure organisations are displaying the most relevant and recently reviewed energy data possible.
